


What is Roblood & who has it?

BLOOD Of the entire U.S. population, only 5%




Individuals with sickle cell disease have abnormal, or 'sickle shaped', red Normal blood cells. These cells cannot transport oxygen well, have a shorter lifespan and aren't replaced as quickly by the body as normal, healthy red blood cells. This can cause anemia. **Aren't replaced**
